Standing up to **fight violence** against children



[Scripture Union Honduras](#) has been supporting children and young people who are at risk through its program 'Together for the Good', which has run preventive schemes in favour of good treatment and ending violence against children and adolescents. Joining with an initiative by the Deborah Program, in partnership with Victims of Child Sexual Abuse and other groups working against sexual violence towards children and adolescents, SU Honduras joined in a protest march during August to raise awareness of the issue.

Speaking about the event, a member of SU Honduras, Delmy Maritza Ramos Sánchez, said: "We joined this very important initiative by our friends in the Deborah Program of the Global Village, in solidarity with victims of sexual aggression and against sexual violence against children, girls and adolescents. Sexual abuse is one of the greatest evils affecting society today, causing huge damage, and it is also one of the most ignored. We want to let anyone who is a victim know that they don't have to stay silent, neither do they need to face this situation alone."

As part of the campaign, lawyer, Gerardo Toledo, visited SU Honduras Lamparita program and shared important information and facts on sexual abuse towards children and young people with the team. He also gave advice on how to prevent abuse and more details about the campaign, 'NO TE TOCA', which aims to see more people taking positive action to prevent abuse against young people and society in general.



about Honduras

Bordered by El Salvador, Guatemala and Nicaragua, the Republic of Honduras is the second-largest country in Central America. Its coastlines stretch along the Caribbean Sea in the north and the Pacific Ocean in the south and it is the only country in Central America without active volcanoes.

Honduras became an independent nation in 1821. In 1969, while Honduras was under military rule, war broke out with neighbouring El Salvador over immigration and the border. Two decades later, Honduras returned to civilian rule and an agreement was reached with El Salvador. A freely elected civilian government came to power in 1982. A third of the economy comes from agriculture, with coffee the biggest export along with bananas.



Honduras is one of the poorest countries in Latin America. The majority of people are Roman Catholic and family life is considered very important. Soccer is also very popular, with most communities having their own teams, in addition to following the national team. In 1998 the country was devastated by Hurricane Mitch, which killed more than 5,000 people and caused huge damage.

Honduras also has one of the world's highest murder rates. Organised criminal groups are very dominant with police, prosecutors, and judges in the pay of gangs and drug traffickers. This corrupts the criminal justice system and means criminals and murderers are rarely held accountable, leading to more violence and crime.

Scripture Union in Honduras is actively working with those at risk and ministering in schools to share Christian values programs, which aim to help children and young people tackle the problems arising from crime and gang violence.
