## DEAR FRIENDS AND SUPPORTERS OF SCRIPTURE UNION...

**The year 2022 will be marked for many of us by the end of the global pandemic and the beginning of the war in Ukraine that is affecting the whole world.**

Costs of living have gone up nearly everywhere and are – again – hurting vulnerable people the most. The peace everyone in Europe had taken for granted has been broken, which brings great confusion, pain, and insecurity, especially to children and young people.

While I was thinking about the bleak status of the world (including the many sad events only briefly mentioned by the news media), I was reminded of a word Jesus gave us for comfort and encouragement: “I have told you these things, so that you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world” (John 16:33).

This is an important and relevant shift of focus when we are feeling the pain of our broken world. But at the same time, it reminds us to open the Bible with children and young people as

they also need to know that there is hope and peace. That we can take heart because Jesus has overcome the world.

Our teams all around the world have worked very hard to share this good news with children and young people, and the global team of Scripture Union International has worked hard to support them in this. We have been able to bring God’s peace and hope to millions of children – in schools, at holiday events, in war zones, in refugee camps, through online programs or our printed Bible engagement resources, helping them to connect with God through his word and through prayer.

The annual report shares a bit of what we have been able to do thanks to the love, prayers, and financial support of our ministry partners. We are ever grateful for your contribution which is also a huge encouragement to us! It gives us the energy to keep on doing what God has called us to do: sharing God’s Big Story with the next generation.

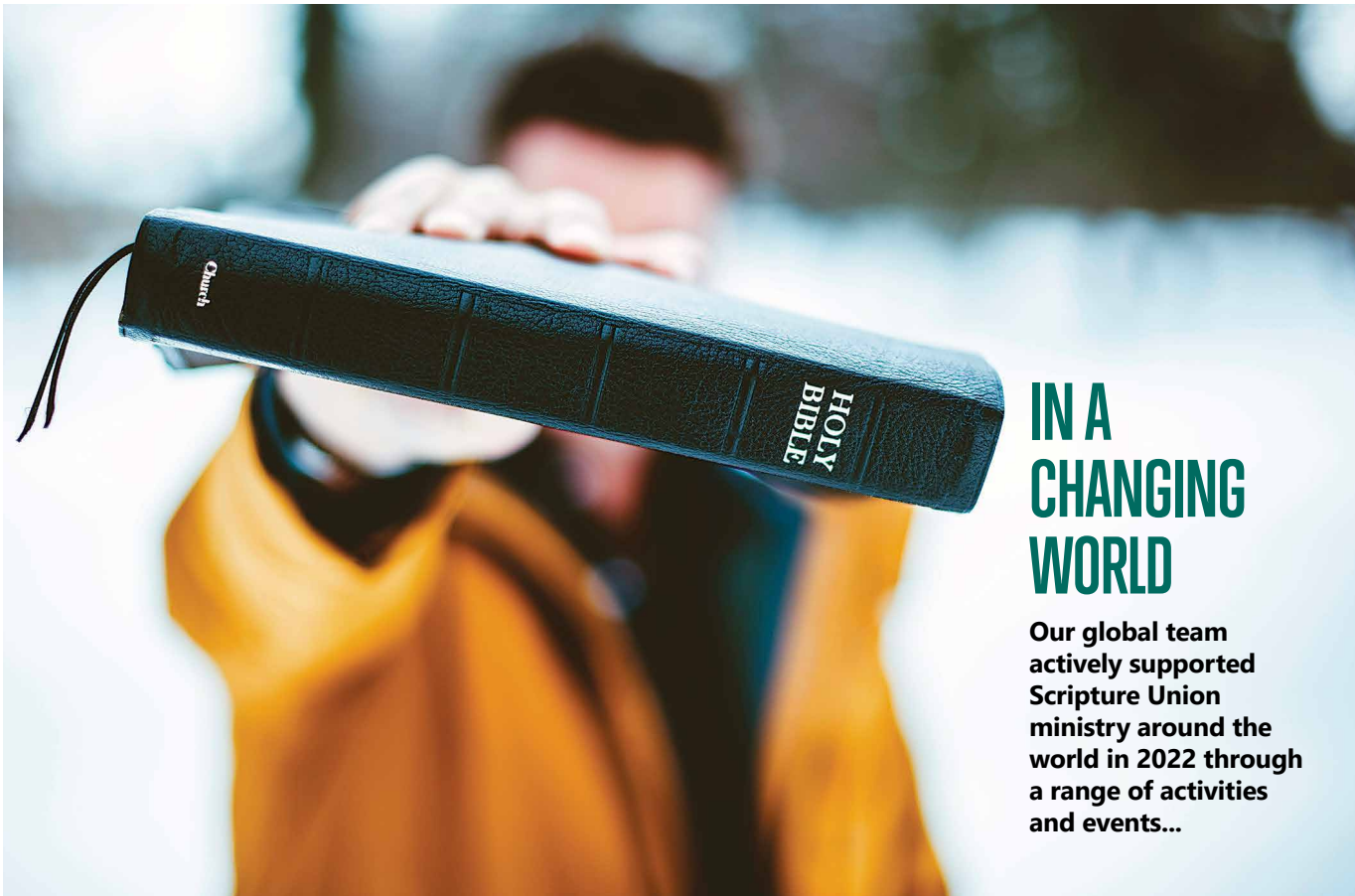

## TRANSFORMATION AND INNOVATION IN BIBLE ENGAGEMENT

**Some 102 participants from 60 different countries took part in Scripture Union International's Bible Engagement Consultation during March and April 2022.**

The three-week online event included some 2,220 hours on zoom with 11 facilitators, seven Bible reflection leaders and a range of presenters and speakers. The conference had a low carbon footprint as it included no flights and no hotel stays and was the culmination of a three year project involving exploration, consultation, creation and evaluation around Bible Engagement. The aim was to make new connections between Bible engagement thinkers, practitioners and influencers, to help them work together to form new networks and discover fresh ways and new resources to inspire children, young people and families.

The main streams looked at Bible Engagement in various contexts including: the public space, the digital arena, in churches, in families and with at risk children, which were all discussed with the themes focused around generations, transformation and innovation for the future.

Keynote speakers from different contexts and different parts of the world addressed the stream topics, which were followed by group reflections, sharing and discussions around each area.

Scripture Union International's director, Monika Kuschmierz, said, "The world is changing rapidly, so engaging with the Bible must be reimagined in the light of shifting cultures, developing trends and a volatile yet highly knowledgeable new generation of children and young people."

**Participants in the Bible Engagement Consultation shared some of their personal reflections from the sessions:**

*It was inspiring to see others having the same desires, challenges and aims – I am not alone! It also reminded me of the importance of spreading the Gospel and gave new insights into the Bible reading. – Meeta Morozov, SU Estonia*

*Since the Consultation, we recently ran our own South African Bible Engagement "story-wall" with a specific focus on how to innovate in the teenager sphere in the next few months. – Alan Pitt, SU South Africa*



Speakers and presenters talked about some of the critical challenges and issues around Bible Engagement in today's world:

- "Experts are dinosaurs, in this post-colonial, postmodern, post-Christian world. Kids know that there's no one expert in this, there's a range of different perspectives."
- "When we talk about innovation, we're not talking about inventing something new, we're talking about mixing together different ideas and methods to come up with completely new ways of connecting with young people."
- "The challenge is for the older generation to walk alongside young people rather than in front of them. The challenge for Scripture Union is to never lose its focus on the Bible as the primary way of encountering God. And the challenge for the church is to define itself as a community and not as an event."

## ENGAGED LAUNCHED

In September 2022 the Bible Engagement Consultation action plan called *Engage* was launched. The aim was to bring together all the thinking and ideas from the consultation to enable the development of new resources and strategies to be shared.

Engage invites every member of Scripture Union to take part and includes top tips section summarising the principles of Bible Engagement from 'creating safe spaces for children' to 'bringing the unchanging Word to a changing world'.

The document also outlines new ways for Scripture Union teams to join together in being creative. A new Bible Engagement Hub is planned, along with content creation workshops, online 'market squares' to share resources and ideas, and resource labs, where new resources can be worked on and developed.

Monika said: "The conversations at the virtual Bible Engagement Consultation and the work in the streams have only been the starting point. Our key calling in Scripture Union is clear, but we have to spell it out afresh for every new generation.

## RESPONDING IN A CRISIS

**Scripture Union International aims to help movements respond and support one another in a crisis, from natural disasters to international conflicts.**

The war in Ukraine was an opportunity for SUI and SU movements to come together and produce new resources to bring hope and share God's message of love with children and families fleeing the war in Ukraine.

The colourful leaflets, designed and produced by a team of SUI staff plus volunteers from around the world, offered puzzles, stories and activities for children in Ukrainian and pointed to further digital resources online, also in their own language.

The new resources were given to children in refugee facilities, at the borders and also to children in Ukraine.

National Director of Scripture Union Slovakia, Natalia Luptakova, said some 4,000 flyers were distributed

by volunteers to many churches and distributing centres, which were preparing welcome packages for refugees. *"We pray that this will be fruitful and people will find God in their difficult situation. We have also been able to give some sample leaflets to local schools for Ukrainian kids and teachers."*

## MINISTRY IN THE SHADOW OF WAR

**The war in Ukraine changed lives and ministry not only there but in other countries in Scripture Union's Former Soviet Republics (FSR) Community Group.**

Community Group coordinator for FSR, Oksana Khimich, said: *"In that way they are suffering the consequences of Russian government actions. In Russia itself it became harder to continue ministry as many volunteers have left the country. Also due to the political situation it is not possible to speak about partnership with foreign organisations. Because of the sanctions it's not possible to transfer grants and to fundraise. Most of the ministry is going on because of the good reputation of SU and local partnership."*

*"In one of these countries the SU work at the campsite continues to provide quality services to local churches. But there is a shortage of volunteers, as more than half of the younger Christians have had to leave the country due to the threat of imprisonment and falsely accused of extremism or terrorism. Transferring funds to the country is not possible, partly due to sanctions and the risk of the government tracing transactions. Besides all of this, the government makes regular checks of facilities and people, so the team have to be really careful about what they do and say, and even what colours they choose for the design of their territory and buildings."*

Wisdom and courage is needed for all the SU workers and volunteers who continue to serve and share the Good News of Jesus in difficult circumstances.





## PUTTING CHILDREN FIRST

**Caring for and protecting children and young people is at the heart of Scripture Union and so SUI's Child Protection and Safeguarding program continues to be rolled out across all Scripture Union movements.**

During 2022 new progress was made in helping more movements approve and implement the SUI Child Protection Policy and ongoing training was delivered throughout our Community Groups.

Training was offered to all movements in English, French, Spanish and Russian. SUI Child Protection trainers and Field Development Directors have worked with Community

Groups to ensure all SU national leaders share best practice and discuss cultural issues that need to be addressed. Advocates are also being trained to keep Child Protection on the agenda of each Community Group, with follow-up meetings arranged to check on progress in each movement.

The aim continues to be for each national movement to have a

locally adapted Child Protection Policy in place, strategy for implementing training, and be able to respond responsibly and according to the legal requirements if a concern is raised.

In the past year out of the 106 movements needing training – 84 per cent have participated.

55 of the 106 movements have developed a Child Protection Policy based on SU International's policy and training and 29 are in the process of contextualising them and having them approved by their Boards.

New training resources for all five levels of Child Protection training have been developed along with new member training and briefings for national directors. Movements have also been taking up the training and advice on recruitment screening, disclosure procedures, safety management systems and secure filing systems and training.

The Scripture Union International Child Protection team continues to lead this work as a high priority, working with movements across the world.

## STANDING SHOULDER TO SHOULDER

From Africa to Asia and from the Pacific to America, Scripture Union teams are coming together as a global network enriching and supporting one another...

### BEYOND BORDERS - THE NEW SU PIONEERS

**The pioneering spirit that began Scripture Union is being shown by some of our Community Groups who are reaching out to new areas where they hope to see new SU movements set up.**

Members of the Pacific Islands Community Group have been inspired by that adventurous spirit that saw the SU movement spring up around the world.

The vision to expand Scripture Union ministry across the Pacific

was shared with the National Director of SU Tonga, Benny Tonga, in 2017. The hope was to plant new movements beyond the existing five in the Pacific Islands.

Benny was inspired by this vision and organised a session to pray for Samoa, where he knew of a Tongan who had married a Samoan and settled in the country. When they heard of the vision to bring Scripture Union ministry into Samoa, they were excited.

Plans are now underway, following the re-opening of the borders after the pandemic, for a team of national directors to visit Samoa and introduce SU ministry to the schools and the church leaders.

Benny said: *"We are grateful to God who put the passion in the National Leaders to carry on the pioneering spirit of our forefathers who planted SU Movements across the world."*

### BUILDING STRONG FOUNDATIONS FOR MOVEMENTS

**The foundation for any thriving Scripture Union movement is good governance.**

Good governance is critical as it helps national movements in three ways. Firstly, it ensures that every national movement does not lose the objective of reaching children and young people with the gospel. Secondly,

it underpins the essence of a movement that is run by volunteers and lastly, it keeps movements accountable for the resources that God provides to run the ministry.

Last year, Field Development Director for English speaking Africa, Tony Nanzah, facilitated online board or council training for national movements in three

of Africa's Community Groups, when Global Board member, Prof Sam Afrane, was able to share his wide experience and helped run some of the meetings.

Tony said: *"We wrestled with such topics as, 'why governance and risk management?'. I thank God that good governance releases national movements to fulfil God's calling in their countries."*



# OPENING DOORS TOGETHER IN CALIFORNIA

**Director of Leadership Lab International (LLI), Steve Meeker, has been excited to see how connections have been made between different parts of Scripture Union coming together for projects.**

LLI, a multicultural training arm of Scripture Union International, trains young Christian leaders from around the world to equip them for ministry. The latest development joined their mentored, experiential program for young disciple makers called 'Transform' with the Scripture Union USA-designed SuperKids® outreach program and linked in a local church, which has English and Spanish speaking congregations in Santa Ana, California.

Steve explained that the Transform participants, aged between 20-28, will gather

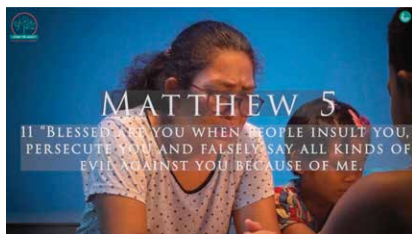
in Santa Ana, California, to receive training in the SuperKids outreach program and Scripture Union USA's curriculum *Who is Jesus?* while simultaneously being mentored and disciplined. He said: "They'll then work with Calvary Church – which is gathering multigenerational support for the outreach, from high school student leaders to adults providing meals and housing for participants – to run outreach in the park."

He said this will be the first outreach of this kind by SU on the West coast. The team has also been encouraged that a volunteer will be translating all the summer training materials and Superkids program into Spanish at no cost. After the translation is complete, students will use the curriculum for an outreach in Ensenada, Mexico, and Scripture Union Latin



America will also be able to use the materials throughout the Spanish speaking world.

Steve said: "The potential for ministry to expand and multiply abounds as participants return home forming new connections and the Spanish materials open up new doors for ministry."



# LEAVING A LEGACY OF PRAYER

**More than 350 people gathered from across the Scripture Union global community to pray over 24 hours as a culmination to the Global Week of Prayer in November 2022.**

The prayers were led by teams from 40 different movements from around the world. One of the prayer week coordinators, Becky Swamickan, said: "We prayed in multiple languages, from Cantonese to Korean, from French to Sinhala, from English to German. It was so uplifting, and we were encouraged as we came together to pray.

"We were privileged to have children and young people who helped us unpack the daily themes, with videos they had created," explained Becky. "We focused on the Beatitudes and the famous words of Jesus from the Sermon on the Mount. Children and young people from Mauritius, Uganda, New Zealand, Myanmar, and Ukraine produced videos that helped the SU Global Family reflect each day on the themes of justice, righteousness, mercy, peace, and legacy."

The week started with a broadcast encouraging everyone to join in and the daily prayer guide was used throughout the week as a guide to prayer.

## TRAINING TOGETHER BOOSTS SUSTAINABILITY

**Special training for Eastern European Scripture Union movements in planning projects has helped them take practical steps towards sustainability.**

The training event in Prague brought together national directors and others involved in finance for their movements, who heard about new trends in fundraising, how to write successful applications and how project plans should fit into annual budgets.

Field Development Director for Europe, Erzsébet Komlósi, said: "This is not an easy topic for

*movements that serve in countries where the evangelical population is tiny, yet it is a must for all movements to take responsibility for raising at least some part of their needed funds – inside or outside their countries. But to do that, they must have a good working knowledge of writing grant applications to potential funders."*

Finance and Grant Manager for SUI, Scott Douglas, facilitated the training event.

Erzsébet said, "Nothing says more about the success of the training than the fact that by the end of the training some participants

*were even able to come up with a viable project plan, which with some additional tweaking was ready to be submitted to donors!"*

National Director of SU Slovakia, Natalia Luptakova said: "Dealing with finances and financial reports is my least favourite part of my work, however it is a very important part of it! With the new system of financial support we spent three days in Prague for a special training to understand it and learn to write projects about specific parts of our ministry. On one hand it was a real pain and struggle. But with practice and great support from Scott I started to understand the process. It will never be my strong side, but I am thankful for the patience and support of our SUI leadership to take care of us and help us grow."

## COMING TOGETHER FOR GOOD

Joining with others in the huge task of sharing God's Big story with children, young people and families helps us do more...

### A HELPING HAND FOR SRI LANKA

**In times of hardship the collaboration between Scripture Union movements can be a light in the darkness for those without hope.**

Last year as Sri Lanka began to face huge challenges to its economy, ordinary people were suffering with power cuts and shortages of basics such as fuel and gas. The rate of inflation rose to 50 per cent a year. Protests broke out in the capital city,

Colombo, in April and spread across the country. The country ran short of fuel for essential services such as buses, trains and medical vehicles because it did not have enough reserves of foreign currency to import any more. In June 2022, the government banned the sale of petrol and diesel for non-essential vehicles for two weeks. Sales of fuel remained severely restricted. Schools had to close, and people were asked to work

from home due to the shortage of basic needs.

Responding to this particular crisis, Scripture Union International helped with a humanitarian grant which enabled SU Sri Lanka to directly support 66 poverty-stricken families with essentials. Other SU movements and individuals also stepped in to support the movement in their efforts to help the poorest.

### A FRESH APPROACH TO SUPPORTING FAMILIES

**Supporting family projects and developing new ways to reach and support families has been a key area for Scripture Union for many years.**

SUI's Family and Children's Ministry Specialist, Terry Williams, has headed up this work in partnership with many other organisations around the world. In 2022 his collaboration with the World Evangelical Alliance (WEA) took him to Finland to present at a family ministry conference on a new framework for family ministry.

Representing Scripture Union, Terry continues to work in partnership with the Global Children's Forum, the Christian Sports Movement and Family.fit, all working to develop plans and projects to serve families. Staff and volunteers from SU continue to produce the majority of the

biblical content for the family.fit resource.

Terry's work in exploring new frameworks for family ministry has been shared with the Global Family Alliance and was the major focus at a European Community Group meeting during 2022. Terry facilitated the three-day process which explored the steps for implementing this framework and engaged the team in workshopping ideas.

SU European Field Development Director, Erzešbet Komlósi, who coordinated the meeting said: "The three days were filled with interactive activities, thought-provoking explorations and many challenges as we were pushed to think about family ministry in a different way. The need is urgent as we see families today, the foundational building block of our society, crumbling."

## SCRIPTURE UNION INTERNATIONAL'S OUTLOOK FOR 2023

### The Global Team and Board have identified a couple of key areas that we want to focus on.

The Global Team will provide further training on Child Safety and Wellbeing for National Movements and work with volunteer advocates to ensure that child protection training for local staff and volunteers will be implemented and the necessary measures put into place.

The next phase of the Bible Engagement Initiative will be a curated hub for sharing relevant Bible Engagement resources among National Movements. A highlight for many movements will be our resource writers

workshops to create new and culturally relevant Bible engagement materials including digital ones.

We are also planning to work with vulnerable movements on developing strategies for local fundraising. A key focus will be the project methodology training in order to enable National Movements to find suitable external support. We will also focus more on how to include Creation Care at all levels of our work.

Bringing together 50 young leaders from around the world is part of our strategy of training and equipping the next

generation, but we also want to listen to them and learn from them. As a global community we will hear their voices at the Global Gathering in March 2024.

We are trusting God to provide the necessary resources as we work towards strengthening the local ministries of Scripture Union globally.

# FINANCE REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2022

Your generosity enabled us to undertake various activities in line with our key strategic intentions. You will note that during the year under review, our income recorded a slight increase from GBP 927,341 to GBP 969,192, and we were able to increase our activities as evidenced by our expenditure which grew from GBP 799,179 (2021) to GBP 1,072,951 – all because you came forth and gave generously. May I on behalf of the Board say thank you – surely the LORD is aware of your labour of love. *Hebrews 6:10.*

We encourage you to continue supporting our ministry efforts as we work in partnership in the Lord’s vineyard.

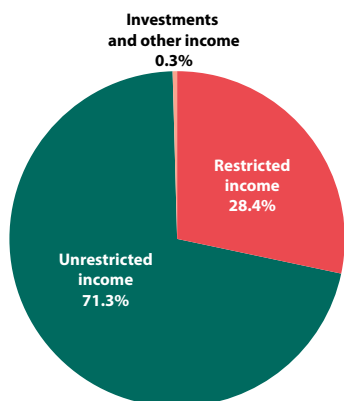

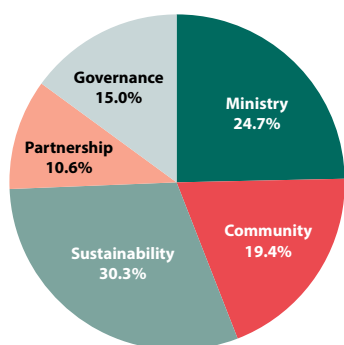

## WHERE OUR INCOME COMES FROM

Our overall income in 2022 was £969,192, a modest increase over 2021 with a shift in the distribution of receipts away from income restricted for National Movements towards unrestricted donations and legacies. The increase in unrestricted income from donations and legacies in 2022 reflects primarily the utilisation of project funding received the previous year in support of the Strategic Needs Initiative, a project designed to facilitate and support ministry activities and sustainable income generation across the SU movement worldwide. SUI field and support staff have been heavily engaged in supporting this programme throughout this period and will remain so in 2023.

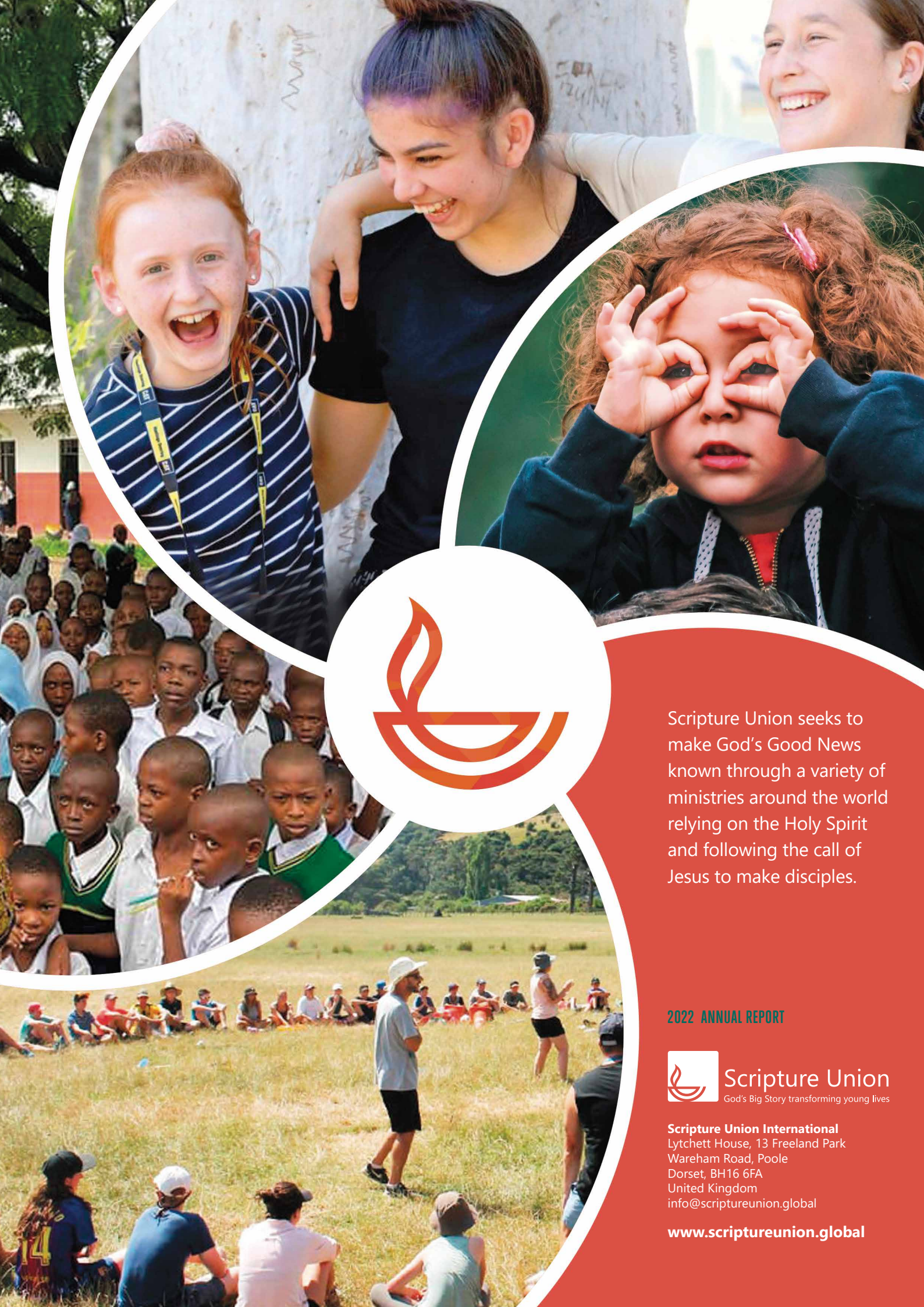
Of the income received that was restricted to clearly specified ministry purposes across the National Movements, the dominant themes in 2022 were the continued support from trusts and foundations for several long-established programmes addressing a variety of needs - including educational and community outreach – and donations intended to support regions in crisis, most significantly, Ukraine. In addition, funding was secured from various sources in support of multiple projects submitted to SUI by National Movements worldwide in response to the Strategic Needs initiative.

## WHERE YOUR MONEY WAS SPENT

Our total charitable expenditure in 2022 was £1,072,951, a significant increase over 2021. This primarily reflects the gradual return towards pre-pandemic levels of operational activity. The allocation of total expenditure to SUI's four strategic objectives remained broadly similar to 2021, with a slight increase in spending related to partnership activities reflecting the return to normal levels of activity and the associated increase in connection with National Movements.

We closed the year with a modest surplus. As was the case in 2021, 70% of the cash and reserves maintained at year-end were for nominated purposes and therefore not available to fund SUI's own direct operational costs. Following the pattern established over recent years, SUI continues to prioritise efficiency and effectiveness across the services it provides to National Movements, with tight management and budgetary control across all financial and administrative costs as an ongoing priority.
